School Bus Drivers Train at Mesick

On March 2, 3, 4 the Mesick Consolidated school will serve as host to all school bus drivers in Wexford county when the annual three-day training school is held.

The school bus driver training course is sponsored jointly by the State Department of Public Instruction, Central Michigan College of Education and the County Superintendent of Schools in each county. Miss Olive Potruide, county school superintendent, has made the arrangements for the program in Wexford county.

All of the larger schools in the county operate busses and drivers will attend from Cadillac, Manton, Haring township, Hoxeyville, Haring, Buckley and Mesick. About 30 drivers will be in attendance for instruction which will be given by George Schutt, Central Michigan College Extension Service of Mt. Pleasant.

Topics for instruction will include legal aspects of transportation, cost of transportation, responsibility and importance of the driver, defensive driving, public control and retirement of non teaching school employees.

Transportation is an important item in the operation of most schools in northern Michigan. About 80 per cent of the students in the Mesick school are transported on 11 busses which cover parts or all 11 townships in three counties.

The bus driver training course will be held in the Springville township hall in Mesick, but part of the work and demonstrations will be conducted in the large school garage.
