Proper hand care is mainly a matter of habit. If you get into the hand-lotion habit, the weekly manicure habit, the chip-repair habit and the work-glove habit the physical appearance of your hands will never be found wanting.

Achieving graceful hands takes a bit more doing. This is particularly true for the woman who always feels "all thumbs."

In such instances, the first step toward grace is the relaxation of tension. Hands would not be awkward were they not tense. Tension is what causes fingers to move like sticks, muscles and veins to stand out like welting. It's also what causes hands to fumble, to drap teacups, clutch handbags and grip chair arms.

For reducing hand tension, this routine is infallable: 1. Spread fingers wide—hold—relax. 2. Make tight fists—hold—and then fling open fingers. 3. Place fingertips on shoulders and then let hands fall imp to sides. 4. Repeat entire routine 10 times.

After each run-through, your hands become less tense and more araceful.
